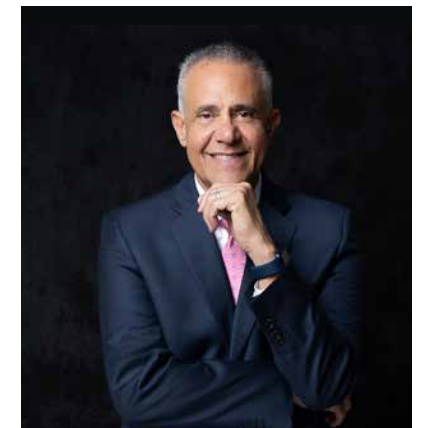

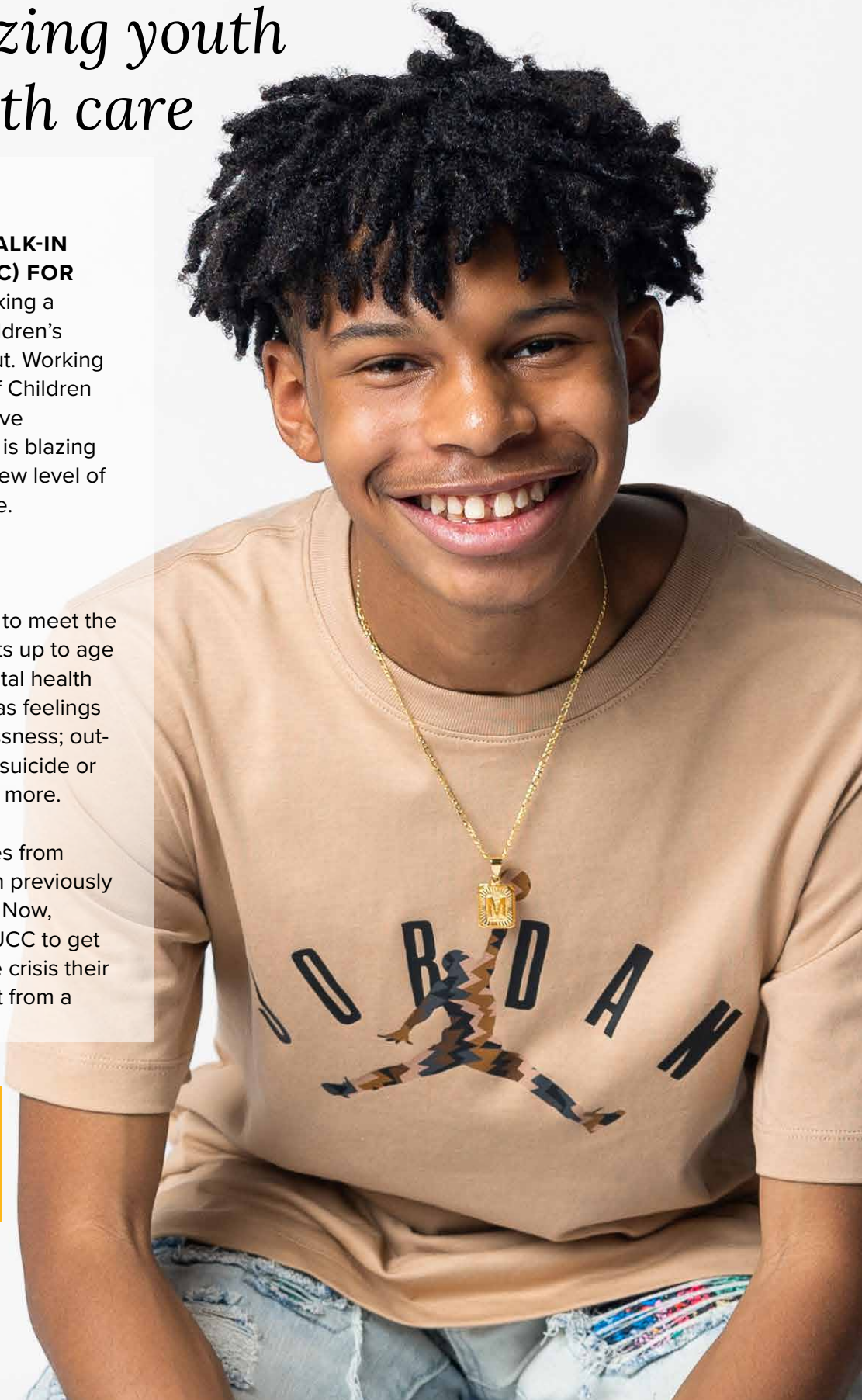
Urgent Crisis Center: Revolutionizing youth mental health care

THE VILLAGE HAS OPENED HARTFORD'S FIRST-EVER, WALK-IN URGENT CRISIS CENTER (UCC) FOR YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH, making a massive stride to address the children's mental health crisis in Connecticut. Working with Connecticut's Department of Children and Families (DCF) and a legislative oversight committee, The Village is blazing the trail for this game-changing new level of behavioral health care in the state.

A NEW LEVEL OF CARE

The UCC is specifically designed to meet the needs of children and adolescents up to age 18 who are in the throes of a mental health crisis, including challenges such as feelings of depression, anxiety or hopelessness; out-of-control behaviors; thoughts of suicide or self-injury; substance misuse and more.

The center can help divert families from hospital emergency rooms, which previously may have been their only option. Now, families are able to come to the UCC to get immediate help to deescalate the crisis their child is experiencing with support from a

multidisciplinary team of APRNs, nurses, clinicians, family navigators, behavioral support specialists and discharge planners that is prepared to meet their needs. No appointment or referral is necessary to receive help.

"The UCCs give families another safe option—a place to bring their child and receive care, support, patience, compassion and good direction on where to go from there and how to get help when they go back home," explains Sarah Eagan, Connecticut's Child Advocate.

At the UCC, trained staff provide crisis stabilization support to youth and their families. The team completes a thorough evaluation and helps connect youth to ongoing support, such as counseling, and also works directly with caregivers to create a safety plan for when they go home. Even after families leave the UCC with added stability and a plan in place, Village staff make regular calls to check in and ensure families are connected to the resources they need.

Part of The Village's historic campus at 1680 Albany Avenue in Hartford, the UCC encompasses 6,000 square feet of newly renovated space and has 19 specially designed patient rooms that provide comfort and privacy.

The rooms are decorated with brightly colored, soft furniture and motivational murals. The UCC is also equipped with fidget toys, weighted blankets and vests for comfort, and other tools to help with deescalation.

For parents just like Tenesha Oates, who has had to miss days of work while her son in crisis waited for the support he needed, the UCC provides both streamlined and immediate help in a place that's designed to be comfortable and calming. It's a place she knows she can turn to in the future.

"Being in the emergency department was beyond terrifying, nerve-wracking and scary. Emotionally, for both of us, it was so hard. The Urgent Crisis Center means not waiting for eight hours just to be seen and also being able to get connected to other resources quicker," she shared.

THE CREATION OF THE UCC

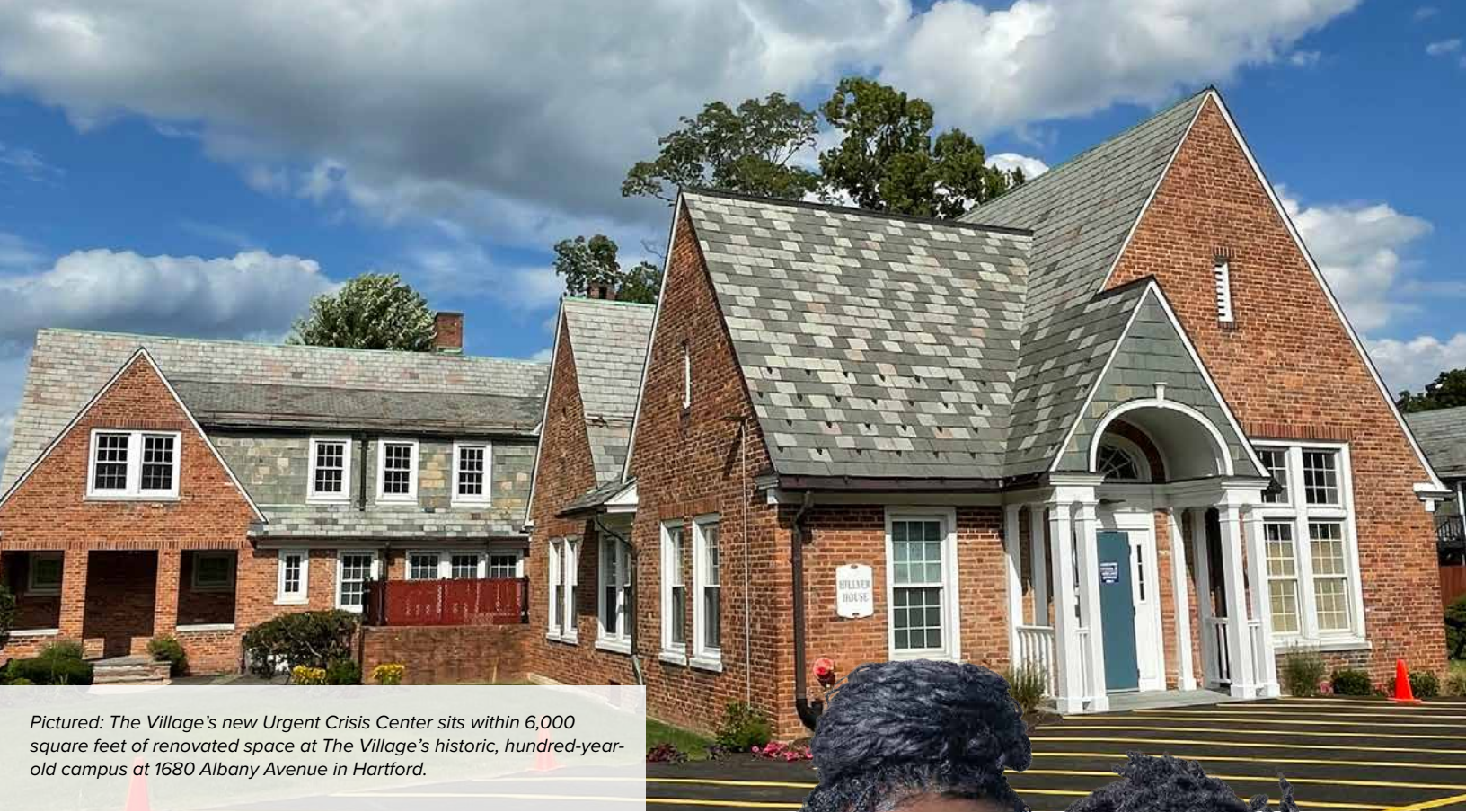
Among the many challenges that came along with the pandemic, the situation uncovered a tremendous need for improvements to mental health care and access statewide, especially for children.

Countless youth were struggling with anxiety, depression and other challenges brought on or

compounded by the pandemic and isolation. When these challenges escalated to a crisis, there was nowhere else for families to turn except already overwhelmed hospitals. Children would end up waiting several hours or even days to be seen.

“We were inundated with kids, and COVID exacerbated the crisis. At any given time, we would see 30-50 children in the emergency department. There were children who truly needed crisis intervention, and there was no place in the community for them to go to other than a hospital emergency room,” said Dr. James Shmerling, President and CEO of Connecticut Children’s.

As the pandemic stretched on, the children’s mental health crisis grew until it eventually took center stage. Community leaders, advocates, parents and

lawmakers were aligned and abundantly aware: something needs to be done immediately to help our children.

It would be the catalyst that inspired the General Assembly and Lamont Administration to create and pass landmark, bipartisan legislation in 2022 that helped develop four UCCs across Connecticut and a new committee dedicated to transforming children’s behavioral health. As one of the state’s most established providers, The Village was called upon to lead the way in Greater Hartford.

The Village stands ready to help along with three other UCC partners in Connecticut: Yale New Haven Hospital in New Haven, The Child and Family Agency of Southeastern Connecticut in New London and Wellmore Behavioral Health in Waterbury. ■



Foster care: Expanding services to help more youth

FOSTER CARE IN CONNECTICUT HAS BEEN TRANSFORMED TO BUILD BRIGHTER FUTURES FOR KIDS. Working in partnership with the state’s Department of Children and Families (DCF), The Village is implementing a new evidence-based model and has become one of the largest foster care providers in the state.

Research shows that children do best when raised with their families of origin. While this may not always be possible, the state’s new foster care model, called Functional Family Therapy – Foster Care, helps families involved with DCF address and overcome challenges they’re facing. At the same time, it ensures that youth are safe and live in stable and supportive homes. Whenever possible, The Village and DCF work hard to keep families together.

“The goal all the time for foster care is reunification. If children can’t be kept safe at home and have to temporarily come into foster care, those lengths of stay need to be short,” explained DCF Commissioner Vanessa Dorantes. “It’s so critical to include the biological family and the foster family so that parents can work in concert to address a child’s needs.”

When a child enters foster care through DCF, The Village and DCF rise to meet the family where they are. Ideally, a child remains in their home while support is put in place to address issues that led to DCF’s involvement.

Sometimes, children need to live with a relative or family friend while issues are addressed at home.

If no relative can provide a home, youth are paired with foster parents who step in to provide short-term “respite” care for about three to nine months.

When reunification is not possible, foster families may choose to continue fostering for a longer term. In some cases, foster parents may choose to adopt.

Many foster parents now also

MEET JENNA

Jenna Nikirk always wanted to be a mom. She had considered fostering—with the hope of adopting—as a way to start her family. Eventually, she and her husband Chris learned that it may be the only way.

provide temporary relief to fellow foster parents who need childcare for an evening or weekend. This means that more foster parents are needed, but for a shorter time.

While the model has changed, the need is greater than ever. On a given day in Connecticut, there are thousands of youth in foster care and nearly 100 in need of a safe and stable home.

Today, The Village’s foster care program covers Greater Hartford, Manchester, New Britain and surrounding towns, and is one of the largest and most comprehensive programs in the state.

Youth supported by The Village’s program have life experiences that have impacted them in complex ways. In a collaborative effort between DCF, The Village and

“There are many ways to start a family. When we had some challenges getting started, a dear friend led us to The Village, and that’s how I began the process,” shared Jenna.

After completing thorough training with The Village, Jenna and Chris officially became licensed foster parents and welcomed a three-year-old boy to their home. That same day, as they signed the paperwork, they learned a home was needed for one of his siblings. With room in their home—and plenty in their hearts—they soon welcomed his twelve-year-old brother, too.

Jenna will never forget the look on the younger boy’s face when he was reunited with his big brother two days later. It was a major comfort to both boys, who had already been through so much.

“The situation left them with no stability and no sense of safety,” said Jenna. “The Village has helped us be more equipped and prepared to provide them with what they needed to heal. The first thing we want to do is make sure they feel safe. That’s the number one priority.”

Backed by 24/7 support from The Village’s foster care staff and clinicians, Jenna and Chris can help support the boys’ unique needs, some of which have come about because of all they’ve been through.

“One of the things I’m proud of in this journey to becoming a mom is that I am able to provide two children of very different ages, who have very different needs, with something they did not have before. A sense of stability. A sense of family,” shared Jenna.

Today, the boys have been with Jenna and Chris for more than a year. As their foster parents, they ensure the boys have regular visits with their other siblings and stay connected. They’re getting the opportunity to be just like other kids, celebrating birthdays and making new friends. The youngest is learning to swim.

To top it all off, Jenna and Chris have begun the process to adopt them.

“When I reflect on what they were like when they first came to us and how they are now,

they’re different people,” shared Jenna. “They’re part of our family unit, and they know that. They know we love them to pieces, and they can give that love back to us. It’s the best thing you can give a child.”

MEET ERNEST

At the end of his foster care journey, Ernest Davis found a loving place that finally felt like home. As a ward of the state from a young age, Ernest grew up mostly in group homes, hospitals and other settings before he eventually entered The Village’s foster care program as a teen.

At first, entering foster care felt new and scary. He had been through a lot and didn’t have a strong sense of what home would feel like, but he stayed hopeful. Eventually his journey led him to his new family. At 23, he’s still involved in their lives. His foster mom has become, more simply, just “Mom.”

“Under the law they are my foster family, but to me they’re more than that,” Ernest said. “They never judged me, and that goes a long way. Even today when I walk into the house, it feels like home.”

His foster family is still a major source of support and motivation, especially as Ernest enters adulthood. His family provided him with structure and key learning experiences he needed to grow. Most of all, he says, they never gave up.

“No matter how much stuff I had going on, they never turned their backs on me,” shared Ernest. “Even

as an adult they stick with me, like any other family.”

Today, Ernest is a father. He holds the important lessons his foster parents taught him close to his heart and imparts them to his daughter, ensuring she knows what a loving and supportive family feels like.

“I had a great foster family, and because of that I can now raise my own child in a way that I know is positive,” he said.

Ernest is still in contact with many of the mentors and support team from throughout his life who helped him through transitions and growing up when he didn’t have anyone else.

“I really appreciate all the help I got from The Village and my social worker at DCF. I had the right people on my side helping me get to where I am today. If it wasn’t for them, I don’t know where I would be.”

Ernest’s time in foster care has also inspired a new goal for him to encourage other youth in care and let them know they can overcome whatever challenges they’re facing.

“I want other kids in the system who are going through a hard time to know that the phase isn’t permanent, and they can change their life in a positive way and can get through it. There’s hope, and it takes time, but there are blessings. I want them to enjoy being a kid whenever they can and enjoy having a home environment and remember that someone is looking out for them.” ■

Children/Teen Mental Health & Wellness

Care Coordination

Trained staff work to connect and facilitate care within Village services and outside providers to provide help managing care for the whole system—behavioral and physical.

Clinic-based Multidimensional Family Therapy

Provides children and teens with an integrated, comprehensive, family-centered treatment.

Eagle House Education Program

A specialized school program for children who are participating in our Eagle House Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility that focuses on trauma-informed practices and positive behavior supports.

Eagle House Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility

Provides comprehensive and intensive behavioral health treatment for children who present with significant emotional or behavioral difficulty and are transitioning from psychiatric hospitalization.

Extended Day Treatment

A six-month day program that supports children in developing and practicing social and coping skills to express their feelings in healthy ways.

Integrated Primary Care

Licensed clinicians and care coordinators work with community physicians and other medical staff to support the whole health of each client—physical, social and emotional.

Intensive Community Program

Provides children and teens with integrated trauma-informed, relational, multi-level treatment for complex psychiatric and behavioral needs.

Intensive In-Home Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Services

Designed to keep children, who are at risk of psychiatric hospitalization or in need of additional clinical support, in their community.

Outpatient Behavioral Therapy (Children & Teens)

Our multidisciplinary team of psychiatrists, APRNs, psychologists and clinicians work with youth and their families to achieve progress and change they're looking for and tackle life's challenges.

Rapid Response

Provides short-term, in-home services for children who have experienced or witnessed a crime in the past 90 days to help reduce the impact of trauma.

Urgent Crisis Center

Provides walk-in outpatient services for children and teens who are experiencing an urgent mental or behavioral health crisis.

Vernon ROCKS Coalition

A collaboration of community stakeholders, parents and youth focused on preventing the use of drugs and alcohol among Vernon's youth.

Adult Mental Health & Wellness

Behavioral Health Intensive Outpatient Program

Provides therapy to treat and manage behavioral health, substance use and co-occurring issues and provide support on building and using coping skills, symptom management, managing challenging emotions and cravings, relationship building and repairing and much more.

Care Coordination

Trained staff work to connect and facilitate care within Village services and outside providers to provide help managing care for the whole system—behavioral and physical.

Integrated Primary Care

Licensed clinicians and care coordinators work with community physicians and other medical staff to support the whole health of each client—physical, social and emotional.

Medication Assisted Treatment

Offers comprehensive support to help adults overcome addiction and set their path to a better life.

Multidimensional Family Therapy

Provides adults with an integrated, comprehensive, family-centered treatment.

Outpatient Behavioral Therapy (Adults)

Using a client-centered and collaborative approach to behavioral health care, our multidisciplinary team of psychiatrists, APRNs, psychologists and clinicians works with adults to set the goals for what they want to achieve and help bring about changes in their lives.

REACH Program

Provides parents and primary caregiving family members with support to enhance their recovery journey and develop a safe support network.

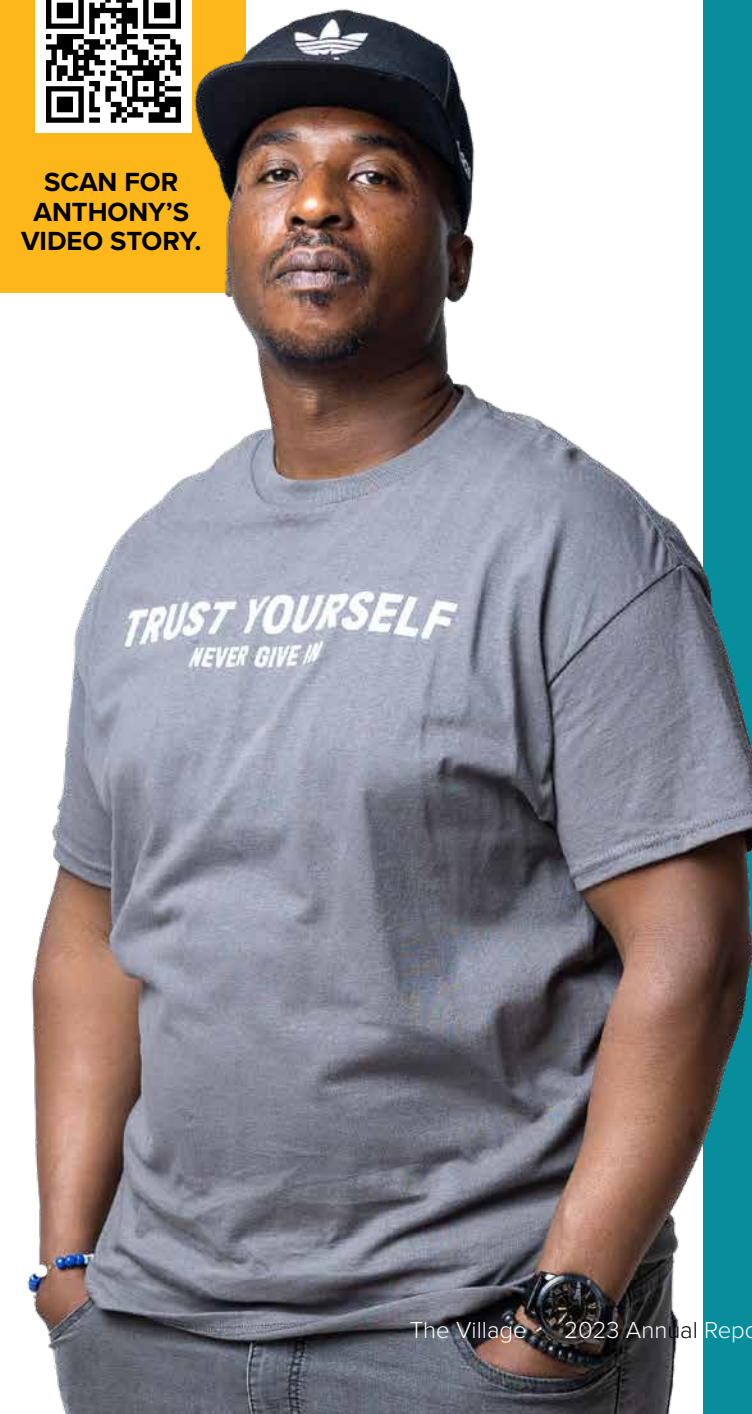

Family Strengthening & School-Based Support

Ascend

The North Hartford Ascend Pipeline (Ascend) is a “cradle to career” effort in collaboration with Connecticut Children’s, local care providers and community-based organizations committed to helping children and families in and around North Hartford access supportive, critical resources to reach their full potential.

Child First

Helps reduce the impact toxic stress can have on a child’s development by strengthening parents’ relationships with their children and addressing families’ basic needs, such as shelter, food, medical care or employment.

Community Support for Families

A family-driven program that helps families strengthen natural and community support systems to maintain safe and healthy home environments, reducing the risk of child abuse and neglect.

Early Childhood Consultation Partnership (ECCP®)

Provides relationship-based consultation services to help parents manage their child’s behavior and improve their success at school.

Early Head Start

Provides parent education, child development information, resources and learning activities with weekly home or virtual visits to help parents strengthen their child’s development through play and creative activities.

Early Childhood Learning Center

Helps prepare preschoolers with the skills necessary to transition to kindergarten and beyond by providing a nurturing, open and safe educational environment that promotes learning, intellectual curiosity, creativity, independence, social skills and physical development.

Head Start Mental Health Consultation

Provides staff, teachers and parents with support for the social-emotional well-being of children in Head Start classrooms across Hartford and Middlesex counties.

Mid-Level Developmental Assessment

Provides families with timely services to address their concerns and bring children who are struggling at home or school back to a normal developmental trajectory before problems escalate.

Parenting During and After Divorce (KIDSAFE)

Educates and trains parents on how to help children adjust in a healthy way to divorce or living apart from a parent.

Parenting Education Program

Helps parents and children adjust in a healthy way after divorce or living apart from a parent/caregiver.

Parents as Teachers

Home visiting program that helps build parental resilience and knowledge of parenting and child development to help children thrive and be healthy, safe and ready to learn.

School-Based Student and Family Support

The Village partners with several Hartford Public Schools to provide children with services and supports to be successful in school and support families’ healthy development through after-school programs, school-based mental health, family resource centers, teen outreach and truancy prevention.

Stronger Families, Stronger Futures (SF²)

Manages partnerships with birthing hospitals and other non-profits, connecting pregnant people and parents with young children to resources to help families thrive.

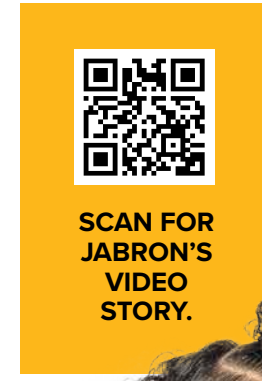
Supervised Visitation

Provides private services to help parents and children who are not currently living together have family time in a safe, neutral and comfortable home-like environment.

Words Count

A parent-directed, play-based program that provides parents with support to increase their child’s vocabulary and enhance their conversational abilities.

Foster Care & Child Welfare

Adoption Services

Help individuals and couples create or expand a family through adoption and supports children and families through the adoption process.

Family-Based Recovery

Ensures that children develop optimally in drug-free, safe and stable homes with their parent(s)/caregivers.

Fatherhood Engagement Services

Works to help strengthen father-child bonds and enhance the level of involvement of fathers in their Connecticut State Department of Children and Families (DCF) case planning, provision of services and positive parenting.

Functional Family Therapy - Foster Care

Serves local youth ages 6-18 who have forms of trauma resulting from neglect and/or abuse. Using the Functional Family Therapy (FFT) model, we provide in-home clinical treatment focused on trauma recovery, case management services and 24/7 support.

Multidisciplinary Evaluation Program

Provides evaluations for children who are placed into the custody of DCF to identify areas of medical, dental or mental health needs.

Quality Parenting Center

Provides a comfortable, home-like environment where parents and caregivers referred by DCF can have family time with their children while they are not currently living together.

Reunification and Therapeutic Family Time

Provides intensive support services for families with children in DCF custody whose permanency goal is family reunification.

Career Coaching

Offered through our Financial Opportunity Center and in partnership with United Way of Central and Northeastern Connecticut, helps adults identify unique skills and interests, build a professional resume, learn the ins and outs of applying for jobs online, improve networking skills and connect to certification programs to build job skills.

Financial Coaching

Our financial coaching services, offered through our Financial Opportunity Center and in partnership with United Way of Central and Northeastern Connecticut, help adults effectively manage their finances and achieve financial goals.

Upward Mobility

A partnership program where coaches work one-on-one with parents and families, empowering them to identify and achieve life goals, connect to community resources and like-minded peers, practice self-advocacy and gain problem-solving and organizational skills.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)

Offered through our Financial Opportunity Center and in partnership with United Way of Central and Northeastern Connecticut and 211 Connecticut, helps individuals and families access free tax preparation, asset-building opportunities, financial education and additional resources.

Support for Justice-Involved Youth

Juvenile Review Board

A community-based program that provides youth who have committed a juvenile offense the opportunity to make things right with an alternative to Juvenile Court.

Linking Youth to Natural Communities

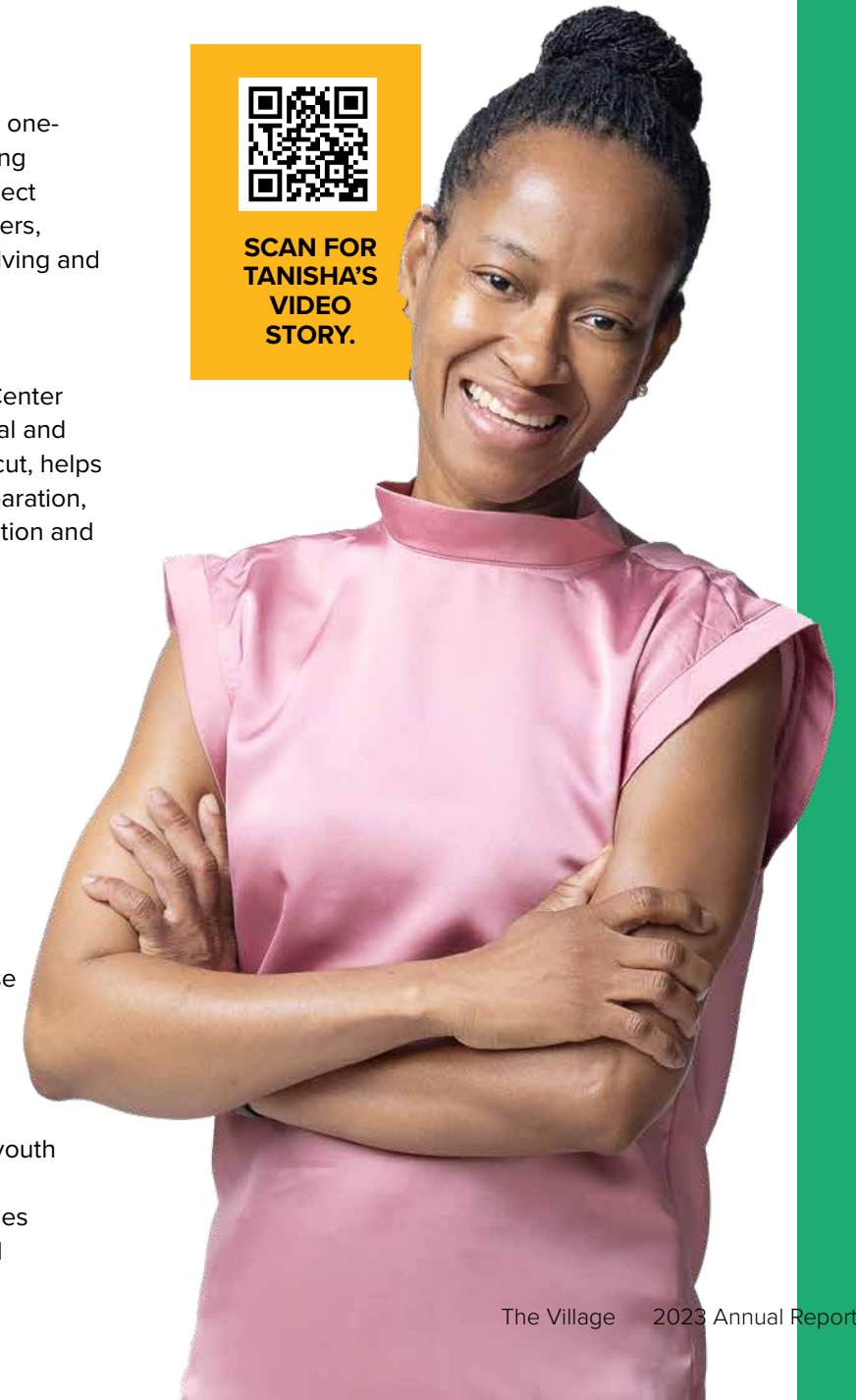
A center-based program for court-involved youth and their families where clinicians work with youth to make sustainable behavioral changes and promote skill-building opportunities and connections to community supports.

FINANCIAL REPORT

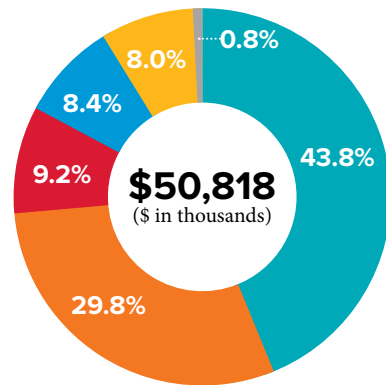

The generosity of donors and the commitment of our staff have placed The Village in the top tier of fiscally strong non-profit providers.

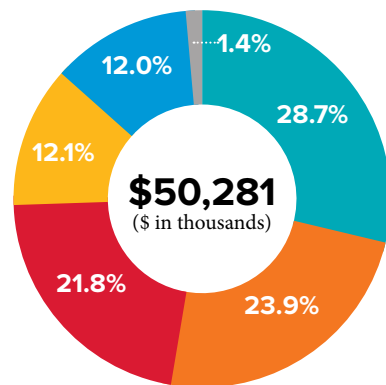

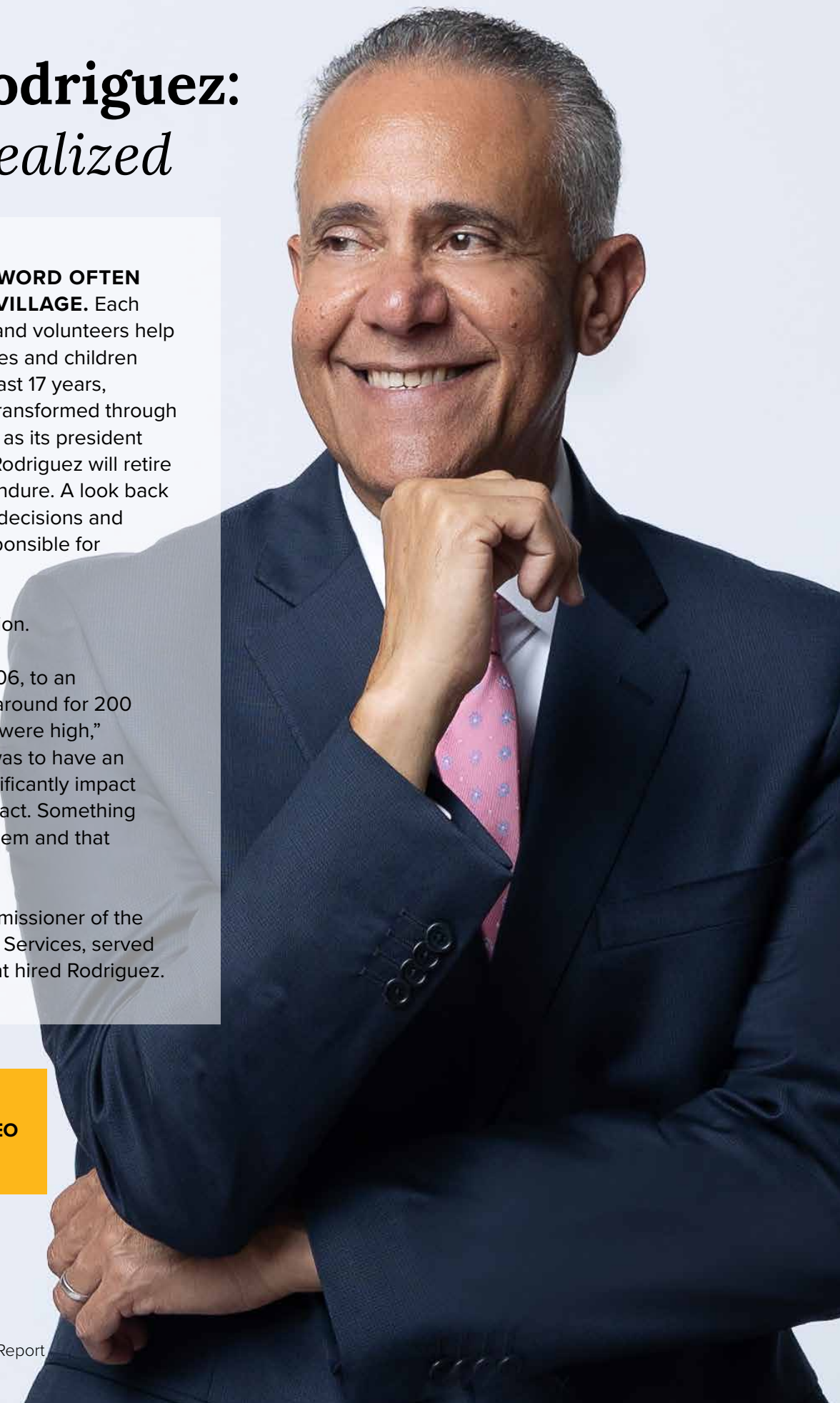
Galo A. Rodriguez: *A vision realized*

TRANSFORMATION IS A WORD OFTEN ASSOCIATED WITH THE VILLAGE. Each year Village clinicians, staff and volunteers help approximately 20,000 families and children embrace change. Over the last 17 years, The Village itself has been transformed through Galo Rodriguez’s leadership as its president and chief executive officer. Rodriguez will retire in 2024 but his legacy will endure. A look back at his tenure reveals critical decisions and calculated risks that are responsible for The Village’s growth.

Underpinning it all was a vision.

“I came to The Village in 2006, to an organization that had been around for 200 years, and the expectations were high,” said Rodriguez. “My vision was to have an organization that would significantly impact people’s lives—a lasting impact. Something that families can take with them and that will transform their lives.”

Andrea Barton Reeves, commissioner of the state’s Department of Social Services, served on the search committee that hired Rodriguez.

She remembers being impressed not only by his credentials but also his unique perspective. She says Rodriguez’s emigration from Colombia, lack of privilege and love of family helped him truly understand the community he serves.

“When I think about the work he’s done, it’s visionary and transformational,” said Barton Reeves.

insisted on not only blurring but eliminating,” said Barton Reeves.

More innovations followed. Village management became less siloed so clients could more easily access different programs. Delivery of services was decentralized and brought closer to the community. Preventing trauma, instead of just treating it, became a priority.

Barton Reeves credits Rodriguez and the board with expanding The Village’s focus beyond children and realizing that strong families are the key to mental health and wellness. Under his leadership The Village added programs and services for mothers, domestic violence survivors, fathers, substance users and those in need of adult outpatient care. A new Financial Opportunity Center was created along with a Quality Parenting Center.

“For a long time, The Village believed the focus should just be on children, but then we started to realize that you can’t support children without supporting families, so this bright line that existed before was one [Galo]

“We knew The Village was great for treatment for foster care, for clinical, for residential care but we need to prevent families from getting there,” said Rodriguez. “We needed to get in front of it, identify at-risk families and start creating evidence based early interventions.”

Dr. Paul Dworkin is the executive vice president for community child health at Connecticut Children’s and has worked with Rodriguez for years. “What’s so remarkable about his legacy is the extent to which he embraced prevention or even promotion of children’s health and well-being,” said Dr. Dworkin.

The Village started overseeing home visiting services in Hartford for at-risk families and began embedding at pediatric offices to truly integrate mental and physical health treatment.

“Galo always leads with optimism, with positive thinking, and with asking the question—how can we best do this—rather than citing all the obstacles we need to overcome to achieve success,” said Dr. Dworkin.

“I hope one day the prevention side will take The Village out of business on the intervention side,” says Rodriguez.

“I think of Galo as a visionary, always thinking about the next thing that can be done and never settling for the status quo. He pushes the organization, and it has improved by leaps and bounds.”

Since Rodriguez arrived in 2006, The Village has more than doubled the number of clients it serves each year. More staff, new buildings and additional programs mean The Village’s reach is far greater than at any time in its 200-year history.

For The Village Board, it’s important that growth coincides with fiscal strength and strategy. Beth Costello is the Chief Financial Officer at The Hartford and a longtime leader of The Village Board’s Finance Committee. She says the finances have improved substantially and that supports the goal of stability and ultimately serving more clients.

In recent years, The Village, like all non-profits, had to navigate the pandemic. Existing clients needed the critical services to continue but the traditional methods of treatment were not always available. In addition, demand for mental health supports skyrocketed from communities outside The Village’s typical service area.

The Village quickly launched a telehealth program, secured funding for a basic needs grant to help families make ends meet and nearly doubled its investment in school-based mental health programs.

Today The Village serves clients in 59 towns, compared to 8 before the pandemic. The new Urgent Crisis Center on the Albany Avenue campus, one of four in the entire state, cements The Village’s role as one of the leading mental health agencies in Connecticut.

So, while the pandemic challenged The Village, it ultimately made it stronger. The Village—thanks to its board, government partners, corporate and private donors, volunteers and staff—met the moment.

John Turgeon is a partner at CohnReznick and was Chair of The Village Board of Directors through the pandemic. He believes The Village is well positioned for the future because innovation and teamwork are part of its DNA.

“One thing I’ve seen with Galo over the last nine years is that he is a magnet for talent. When you think about all the people who are here today and the people who have come on board during my tenure, you can see he wants to bring people here who have the same passion and vision and appetite for success that he has had.”

Hector Glynn, a longtime Village executive, says Rodriguez’s mentorship will help him succeed as the agency’s next president



and CEO, “There is no doubt Galo’s impact will be felt for a very long time. I hope he can take a step back and appreciate what he’s been able to accomplish for families and children.”

Rodriguez does not spend a lot of time looking back. He’s more inclined to think about The Village’s future, gratified that his legacy will help shape it.

“Every time I see a family making a big change, a child having coping mechanisms for trauma, able to control nightmares, tantrums, anxiety, every time I see changes, I feel great. I tried to instill that passion in The Village’s workers because it is not Galo’s Village or agency. It belongs to 600 workers, working together to fulfill the mission.” ■

A legacy of caring and love

BARRY LASTRA GREW UP IN THE PERIOD OF WORLD WAR II.

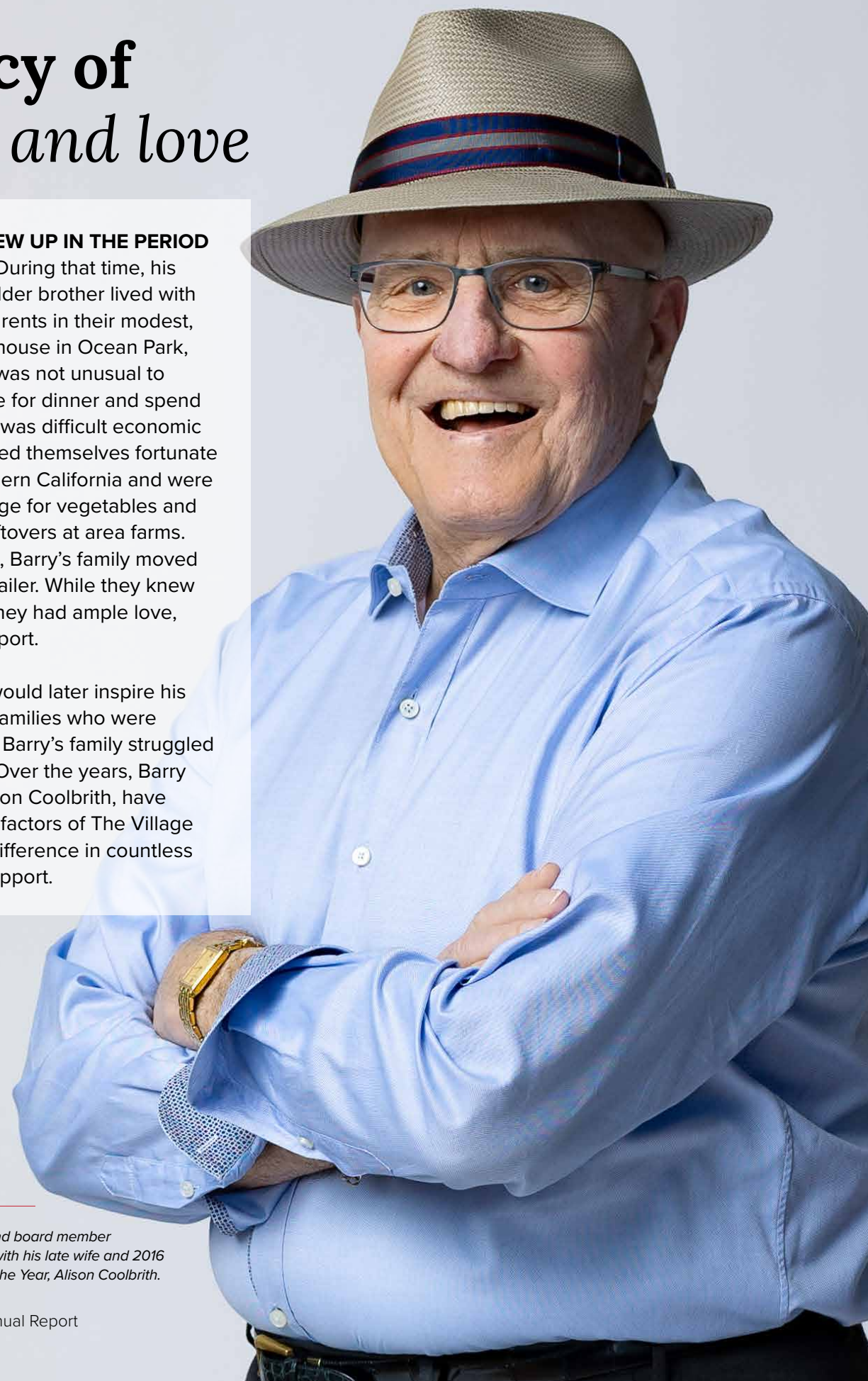
During that time, his family, parents and older brother lived with his maternal grandparents in their modest, two-bedroom rental house in Ocean Park, near Los Angeles. It was not unusual to have an aunt or uncle for dinner and spend a night or more, as it was difficult economic times. They considered themselves fortunate to live in fertile Southern California and were able to regularly forage for vegetables and fruit in the harvest leftovers at area farms. When the war ended, Barry's family moved into a small mobile trailer. While they knew money was scarce, they had ample love, family and moral support.

These experiences would later inspire his deep desire to help families who were struggling, much like Barry's family struggled when he was a boy. Over the years, Barry and his late wife, Alison Coolbrith, have been generous benefactors of The Village and made a lasting difference in countless lives through their support.

"I learned there are a lot of people who need a lot of help," Barry said. "This is the beginning for what made me want to be engaged with the community. I knew it was the right thing to do to help however I could."

Barry went on to have a storied career at Chevron Oil Company, where he worked for 36 years before retiring from his role as a public affairs executive. Alison, who had a long and distinguished career as a senior executive at Aetna, sadly passed away in 2015, leaving behind a shared legacy of giving that Barry carries out today.

In 2016, Alison was posthumously named The Village's Woman of The Year at the annual Girl Within event for the fierce and fearless energy she poured into improving the lives of others, especially women in Greater Hartford. Barry accepted the award on Alison's behalf and—coupled with his own generosity—continues to make a lasting impact in the community in her honor.

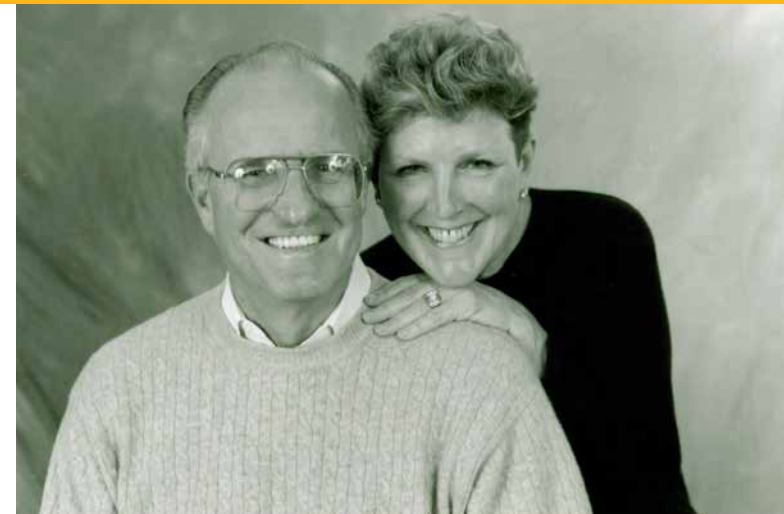

Through his generosity, Barry continues to fill the gap: creating opportunities for others that he didn't have during his childhood. He serves on The Village's Board of Directors and boards of other nonprofits. He also manages the Lastra Coolbrith donor-advised fund at the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving, the focus of which is helping young people in need.

"My friends and colleagues often ask me why I feel strongly about giving back," Barry said. "I do it because it's the right thing to do, and that gives me a great deal of pleasure." ■
